# **Central Phoenix site** being refurbished into condominiums

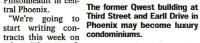
A San Diego developer plans to convert a vacant, 10-story office building in central Phoenix into luxury

Joe Pinsonneault bought the old Qwest Communications building at 3033 N. Third St. for \$12.5 million.

He plans to convert the building into about 80 luxury resi-dences and add another 148 loft-style residences on the surrounding eight acres.

The office buildingto-residential conversion could be the first of several for Pinsonneault in cen-

other (Phoenix of-



fice) buildings," Pinsonneault said. "We hope to buy three or four more buildings downtown."

Pinsonneault has completed several residential and mixed-use projects in San Diego, Coronado and Imperial Beach, Calif. He said he also is "working on a deal in San Francisco for 179 units downtown right now."

"The reason I'm coming to Phoenix is to duplicate the Gaslamp District and try and build a few units here to revitalize downtown Phoenix like they did in San Diego,' Pinsonneault said.

Helping Pinsonneault crunch the num-bers to determine the costs of the project are Rich Fairbourn and Andy Byrnes, copresidents of The Construction Zone Ltd. Tentative sales prices are \$350 to \$450 a

The proposal includes adding under-ground parking for 160 vehicles south of

the building.

The new residences will have four stories, with the ground floor reserved for individ-ual garages. The lofts will range from about 1,000 to 3,700 square feet. The project manager is CMX, where Chief Executive Don Dillon said the Phoenix team

will include CMX, The Construction Zone, ar-chitect Paul Krucko of Studio 4 Design, zoning attorney Nick Wood at Snell & Wilmer, Christine Ten Eyck of Ten Eyck Landscape Architects Inc., and Scott Jarson of Jarson &

Jarson, who will oversee marketing.

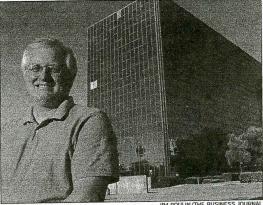

said. "His buildings are so minimal. He was so far ahead of his time.

For a while, Fairbourn was safeguarding a large collection of Beadle's original designs. He since has turned them over to Arizona State University's College of Architecture.

Fairbourn and other members of Pinsonneault's team rairrourn and other memoers of rinsonneaturs team say they are unaware of any contemporary midrise office building in Phoenix — much less a Beadle building — that has been converted into residences. Fairbourn's office is in another Beadle building across the street from the old Ouest building

Qwest building.

The building is in the district of Phoenix City Councilman Tom Simplot, who said the renovation could boost redevelopment on the vacant or underutilized properties on Third Street between Thomas and Indian School roads.

"I think this continues the regentrification that is quickly moving north," Simplot said.
